THE celebrated Swiss mime artist, Dimitri, is to give six performances at the London Mime Festival at the Shaw Theatre this month.

Born in 1935 at Ascona in the Ticino, he did his artistic training in Paris at the Etienne Decroux school of pantomime and later became a member of the Marcel Marceau troup. He did his circus training with the clown Maisse.

He gave the first performance of his solo programme in his home town of Ascona, since when he has appeared in most of the world's capitals.

In 1971 he opened his own theatre in Verscio, in the Ticino, and four years later founded a

theatre school there. Major awards he has received have included the Grock Prize (named after Switzerland's greatest clown), the Silver Mask and the Hans Reinhart Ring.

Marcel Marceau wrote of his former pupil: "Il y a chez Dimitri une fraîcheur naïve, une simplicité et l'âme du poète. Il a l'étoffe d'un grand, et sa jeunesse et sa persévérance lui ouvriront de grandes voies. Clown-musicien. Dimitri nous livre son coeur, fait vivre les objets réels comme des personnages de légende.

"Dans les projecteurs il apparaît avec son visage poétique et écarquillé comme une grande étoile. Dimitri, clown d'Ascona, nous vous regardons avec notre âme".

And another international artist who knows him well, Yehudi Menuhin, wrote: "Dimitri is a clown in the very greatest tradition, a clown who can move one from tears to laughter in a split second and without uttering a word.

"He knows our deepest sorrows and our greatest elations through his own, and because he has compassion. Whether it is a five year old or an eighty year old, he touches them all in the same way.

"A wonderful musician, a remarkable acrobat, a juggler, and above all an artist, a human being who remakes us in the image of a child".





Kentner's pupil visits Britain

THE Bernese pianist, Christine Harnisch, who gives a recital at the Purcell Room, London, on January 3, did part of her musical training in London with the celebrated Louis Kentner. She has since given recitals and appeared with orchestras and chamber music ensembles in Switzerland, France and Austria, and given numerous performances on the radio. This month's recital is, however, her first professional appearance in England. This year Miss Harnisch will make her first LP, which will introduce her talent to a much wider audience. IN a tribute to the Swiss composer Bernard Reichel, a performance of his "Gloria" was held in King's College Chapel, Taunton, last month given by the Somerset Opera Group, the Taunton Choral Society and the Somerset County Orchestra.

Over the last 12 months many concerts of his music have been held in Switzerland in celebration of his 80th year.

Bernard Reichel has written more than 200 works and his compositions are very well known in Switzerland and Germany, although not in Britain.
