It's all voluntary, no red-tape or rank, just a souvenir medal at the end to tell the world the hoofer did his or her desired stretch.


Naturally we're talking about the Swiss Two-Day March, a former military exercise now become a popular sporting event and annual get-together in Berne.


What began as the Bernese "rifle run", a race with carried weapons, is today characterised by just plain people who like to walk ... and talk.
