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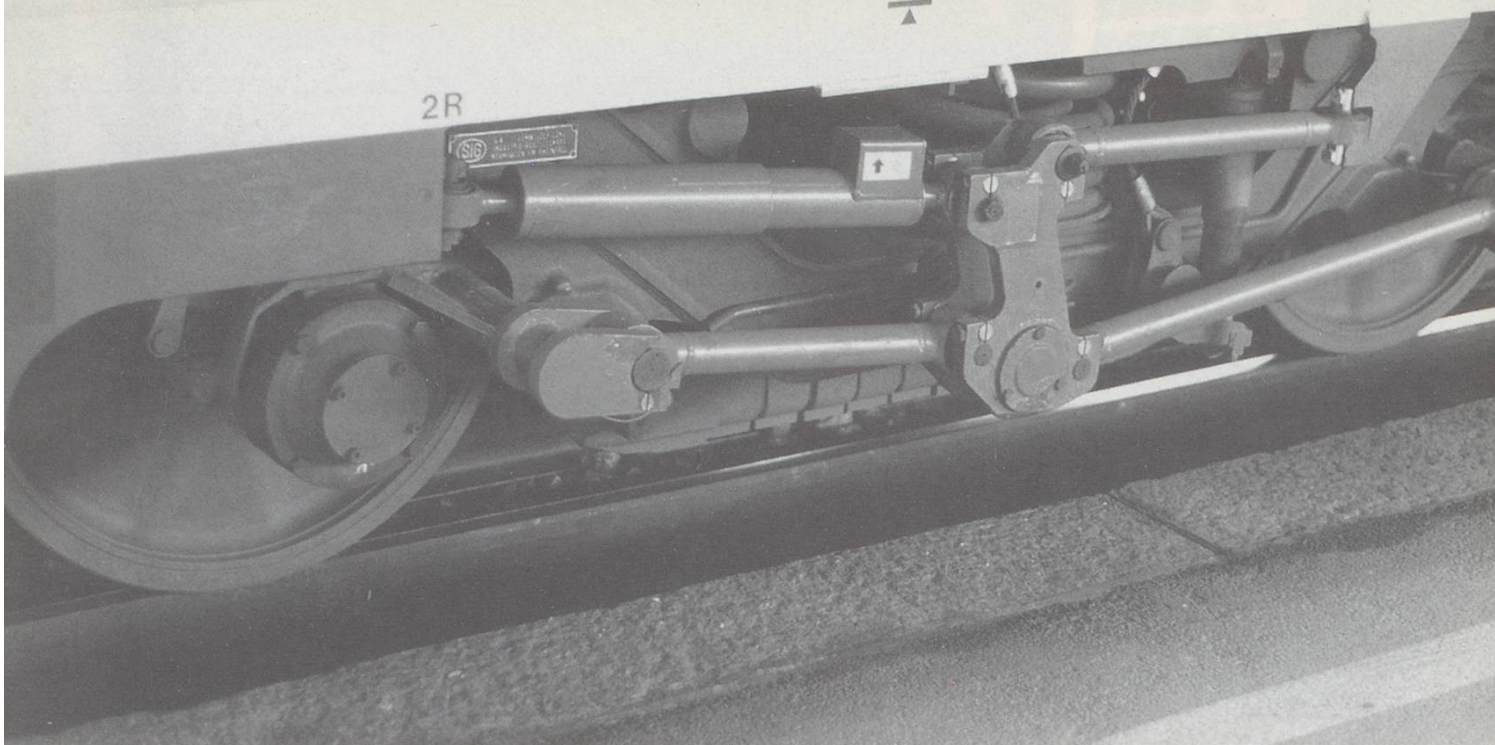

### Modelling Swiss Railways

As an addendum to the articles in Swiss Express by Peter Marriott about buildings, I have the following information. Marcle Models of Turnagain, Finch Lane, Amersham, Bucks, HP7 9NE, have a huge catalogue (£2.50) of card models including architectural models at a scale of 1:87 and 1:160. Models include buildings sufficient to be a small 'German' town but more importantly at least five sets of buildings to build an 'Alpine' village. There is even a model Schloss Thun in 1:160 scale at a cost of £26.95, the other buildings being considerably cheaper from £5 or so.

The building of the models is straightforward, they are self coloured and very robust, I have had a series of three German castles for over ten years with no sign of deterioration.
