We all met up on platform 2 at Interlaken Ost station. We left in a reserved coach of the BOB at 9.32 for Lauterbrunnen. The party consisted of James Evans, Director, Railway Relations, Eurotunnel, his wife and various members of the press and public relations dept., as well as representatives of Jungfraubahn and of course the press, Swiss and British (3).

On arrival at Lauterbrunnen we were shown to a special train of the Wengern Alp Bahn that followed behind the normal services. At Wengen James Evans left our train, our train was the last of four climbing towards Kleine Scheidegg. As we approached the small halt at Allmend the train was stopped by James Evans holding a red flag. When we stopped a director of the Jungfraubahn Railways presented James Evans with a Station masters hat and a certificate announcing him as honourary station master of Allmend. This came about because at dinner on the evening before James mentioned that when he retired he would like to become the station master at Allmend, this was the first of several surprises.

At Kleine Scheidegg we joined BDhe2/4 209 for the journey to Jungfraujoch, the naming was to take place at Eismeer station. At Eigergletscher our train stopped and we got off to look at the Huskies, they live here and are transported to Jungfraujoch to give the tourists sleigh rides.

After a short stop we moved on. Rounding the first bend in the track we were greeted by an Alphorn and Flag thrower (cover picture). We stopped and photographed the event. After ten minutes the two joined the train and we moved of rounding the next bend we were greeted by a lone Scottish piper, playing by a Union Jack. Again we photographed the event, the piper joined the train, we moved off into the tunnel to the top. At Eigerwand halt we were greeted by a French accordian player complete with beret and puffing a cigarette. Some spontaneous dancing took place, we admired the views from the windows of the Grindelwald valley and then rejoined the train with our strange band.

At Eismeer we all left the train. Here the speeches commenced and the presentation of a beautiful wood carving with 209 on it was presented to James Evans. The naming was carried out by Mrs. Joanna Evans and so as not
