The objective is to give members longer notice of the arrangements for the AGM, constitutionally required to be held before the end of March, and to avoid the Membership Secretary receiving the bulk of the renewals at the same time as his/her Christmas cards.

In a group where all the work is done voluntarily, it is inevitable that professional and family concerns have to come first, though it often does not feel like it. In my less sane moments, I wonder if there shouldn't be a clause in the Constitution that all Society officers must be single and retired!
